Putting Readers First: An introduction to the reader-centred approach

Rachel Van Riel is the Director of Opening the Book (www.openingthebook.com).

Prior to creating Opening the Book in 1990, Rachel taught in university and adult education, followed by working in arts development. She discovered that libraries offered the best possible context for the work she wished to do. The reader development movement which emanated from the work of Opening The Book has changed the way public libraries engage with their users. Every library service area in the UK now has reader development integrated into their core services.

Topics to be covered in her workshop:

- To explore the principles and practices of reader-development – promoting books from the reader’s point of view
- To demonstrate how an understanding of consumer psychology can help create successful library promotions
- To consider how a reader-centred approach can be used both inside and outside the library and online
- To outline a range of low-cost and easy-to-implement ideas which can be instantly put into practice to offer added value to library readers



Andrew Pyper

Luncheon Speaker

Andrew Pyper was born in Stratford, Ontario in 1968. He received a B.A. and an M.A. in English Literature from McGill University in Montreal, as well as a law degree from the University of Toronto. Although called to the bar in 1996, he has never practiced.

His debut novel, *Lost Girls*, won the Arthur Ellis Award for Best First Novel (1999); his second novel, *The Trade Mission*, was listed by The Toronto Star as one of the Ten Best Books of the Year; his third novel, *The Wildfire Season*, was a Globe and Mail Best Book of the Year; and his fourth and latest novel, *The Killing Circle*, is a national bestseller, a New York Times Crime Novel of the Year, and was short-listed for the 2008 Evergreen Award. A new novel, *The Guardians*, is coming in 2011. He lives in Toronto. (www.andrewpyper.com)
